

He is very big and black.




He has eight legs and eight eyes.





He has small hairs all over his body.






Jack the funnel-web spider attacks prey from his hole.



He catches and eats insects like flies, butterflies and cockroaches.






He waits in his hole until he sees his prey.


When it is close enough he pounces on it, attacking it with his fangs.






Jack the funnel web spider is poisonous.





Funnel-web spiders, like Jack, have to be careful of predators.








Jack the funnel-web spider is my favourite spider, but I wouldn't touch him!
