
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


Caroline the spectacular Turquoise parrot lived in her nest, in the hollow of a huge old tree near the creek.

It was breeding season and she was waiting patiently for her four eggs to hatch.









Caroline flew over to the tree to see what was wrong.

"This land is going to be cleared to build a big resort. All of our homes will be destroyed!"








Caroline didn't know when her home was going to be destroyed.

All she knew is that she couldn't let this happen to her land.




The animals of the woodland spent all afternoon trying to find a way to stop the builders from clearing their land.






After hours of thinking Caroline came up with a great idea.


"I've got it! I know how we can solve this problem," she chirped.






All of the animals agreed. A great performance for the people might show them what a special place their creek home was.
