













"So Gus, why shouldn't we eat that? It looks so tasty," replied Trevor.

"Neither can mine," groaned Trevor.






Eventually they reached a side of a road. A car whizzed past. "How are we ever going to cross this road?" said a worried Percy.

"It looks to me like a Peron's Tree Frog and a Murray River Turtle," replied Stacee, Dr Dave's assistant.








A few days later, when their stomachs were full and they felt much better, Dr Dave released them into his native garden.

WILD FACTS

Murray River Turtle

- Male Murray River Turtles have a fatter and longer tail than the females.
- The Murray River Turtle eats molluscs (snails), crustaceans (yabbies) and water plants.
- Murray River Turtles have a short neck and grow to about 30 cm long.
- The character Trevor is based on a Murray River Turtle saved by WIRES. He was cared for and released by Jacqui Kirk and family.

Peron's Tree Frog

- They grow between 30-70 mm long.
- The Peron's Tree Frog eats small insects or invertebrates.
- They also have the ability to change colours quickly.


Kookaburra

- Kookaburras have a life span of 20 years.
- They grow to a size of 30-45 cm.
- Also the kookaburra weighs up to 450 grams.

Golden Perch

- The female Golden Perch can hold up to 500,000 eggs.
- The maximum age of a Golden Perch is 26 years old.
- Golden Perch can be found in warmer, turbid, slow flowing rivers.
