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


Buddy and Cocky heard the water splash.

And Cocky said “No, I don’t think so.”










When Pippy saw Garry the Gambusia she started swimming very, very fast. Suddenly the current started to take her downstream.


Buddy and Cocky were waiting




Buddy and Cocky saw a little fish swimming its tail off, and a bigger fish chasing it. They knew that the small fish was Pippy.

WILD FACTS

Budgies

- Budgies live up to 12-15 years
- They breed all year round.
- They can be blue, yellow, white, green, grey and violet.
- They poo every 12-15 minutes.
- They see in colour.
- They have between 4-6 average eggs every round.
- When tamed, they can be smart.
- The babies stay in the breeding box for about 6 weeks.

Cockatoos

- They are white
- They can be pink and black.
- They eat sunflower seeds.
- They can have red, yellow, white crests.
- They can live up to 100 years.
- They live in NSW, QLD, TAS, NT and a little bit in WA.
- They have been introduced to Perth.
- They are 44-55 cm in length.

Pygmy Perch

- They live in slow flowing or still water.
- They are 65-85 mm long.
- They live in the Billabong Creek.
- They produce 100-4200 eggs.
- The eggs hatch between 2-4 days.
- They are carnivorous, which means they eat meat.
- ***This species is threatened.***
- Gambusia are their main threat.



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
