"My name is Bob, I'm a magical gum tree. Don't you worry little one, I will contact the wildlife centre for you," replied Bob in a soothing mystical voice.







They were to find out if they passed the next day...




The day after the test Stacee rang Bob to let him know that they had passed! YAY!
