He said, "Need a ride mate?"


Kingston spat out a mouthful of water and gasped, "Yes please."





Kingston clutched onto Callum's back.


Callum swam gently toward the bank; he floated closely in the shallows for Kingston to make his escape.
















Edward the Emu was busy guarding an area close to his chicks. Kingston said, "Any chance I can hang out with you and your babies?"
