





# WILD FACTS

## **Brushtail Possum**

- A marsupial, so has a pouch
- Colour patterns are silver-grey, brown, black, red or cream
- Has a very brushy or bushy tail
- Eats eucalyptus leaves but will also eat flowers, shoots, fruits, seeds, insects, birds' eggs and small vertebrates.
- Has a scent gland in its chest for marking its territory
- Sometimes lives in towns and cities

## **Diamond-backed Python**

- A reptile snake
- Can grow up to 2.4 metres in length
- Lays 10-50 eggs in a nest
- Lives for 20-30 years
- Eats small mammals, bats, birds, lizards and eggs.
- Weighs up to 20 kilograms
- Not venomous
- Likes to live in and under structure where it can hide
