This inspiring story follows the life of Ian Rolf Eggleton, Tumbarumba's very own environmental hero. Ian is named after his grandfather Rolf who died when Ian was very young. In Tumbarumba, Ian is known as 'Boots' (most people would not even know his real name). This nickname was given to him by his boss Lenny Perkins many years ago. One night Ian went to a ball and wore his fancy boots (as he fondly calls them). He had a late night and went straight from the ball to work but didn't have time to change into his work boots. Ian climbed under a Land Rover to catch up on sleep. Lenny found him with his fancy boots sticking out the side of the truck. From that day forth Ian was known as 'Boots'.





Boots was born on the 19th of August 1956. His family were some of the early settlers of the Blowering Valley in Tumut. They were forced to move when Blowering Dam was built. Boots moved around the area a lot before finally settling in Tumbarumba in 1990. Here he met his wife Mandy whom he has been happily married to for 20 years. Boots and Mandy both agree that their wedding day was the first and last time Boots has ever worn a formal suit.



Boot's youth was spent fishing, camping, doing cattle work and farm chores. His great love was animals and the environment. From a young age Boots and his family took in and cared for injured animals. Even today he and his family do the same. They have taken in emus, wallabies, echidnas, birds, lambs, poddy calves and Teddy the Turtle, whom they had for five years. Boots is a Pest Animal Contractor for New South Wales National Parks. He has been in the industry since he was 17. His work is centred in the Kosciusko, Blue Mountains and Wollemi National Parks. Boots is saving the natural environment by trapping and killing pest animals like foxes, cats and wild dogs that are destroying the environment by killing native animals. Boots believes nature is about holding the balance.





He also traps and relocates possums, wombats and brumbies. In doing this he is saving many endangered animal species from future extinction. At the top of Boots 'to save' list is the Pygmy Possum, Bandicoot, Eastern Quoll, Smokey Mouse, Broad-Tooth Rat, Kangaroo Rat, the Rock Wallaby and many native frog species.



Boots has been involved with the National Parks for 42 years. He says he doesn't just work for them, he fights for them. To him his work is not just a job, it's his passion. He works 7 days a week, on average 18 hours a day and is on call 24/7. He believes anyone can do his job but it takes passion to be good at it.

Boots is too humble to see himself as an environmental hero. He says, "I am just doing what I think is right for the environment and the world. We have to think beyond us; if we look after the environment, it will look after us." Boots is so good at his job his knowledge and skills are sought after country wide by politicians, lawyers, judges and environmental agencies. He is currently advising the NSW Minister for the Environment, the Honourable Robyn Parker MP, on protecting State National Parks from being irrevocably destroyed by hunting enthusiasts.



Boots believes in humane trapping. He uses rubber jaw traps (see photo below), rather than poison or metal jaw traps because he doesn't like to see any animal suffer. He says, "It doesn't matter if it's an ant or an elephant, they all still feel pain." Boots believes we all need to respect animals whether they are pests or not. He says, "you don't have to be cruel in this job to be good at it."

One of the things Boots loves about his job is that he never stops learning about animals. He thinks animals are like people in that they all have different personalities and you have to work them out in order to catch them.

Boots requires lots of equipment to do his job well. In addition to his traps, he uses decoys with special scents

and his expert and loyal dog Rip who helps by sniffing out the animals. His 4WD is stacked with traps, spotlights, cages, cameras, GPS and video equipment, rifles, bullets, setters and decoys. Boots also takes a buggy, motorbikes and a trailer out with him.



Boots takes few creature comforts with him to the bush. He has a swag, cooking gear, food and lots of warm clothes especially thermal wear to keep him warm. Even Rip needs a coat on cold nights.

Boots sometimes sleeps in huts but he likes to sleep out in the open and look at the stars. He also listens to the environment and the animals. He howls to the dingoes and waits for their reply.



We really enjoyed our time spent getting to know Boots. He is a kind, gentle and funny man. His passion for the environment is inspiring and we learnt a lot from him.
