As a child, Dr. Dave lived in Melbourne and made many trips to the country with his parents. These trips developed his keen interest in the bush. At the age of five, he announced to his family that he would go to university and become a biologist to study animals.

At school he was known as 'Dr. Watson'. Whenever somebody found something they would ask him what it was. If he didn't know, he would find out.







Dr. Dave works as an associate professor in biology at Charles Sturt University. He goes on many research trips for his work. On a field trip to Mexico he discovered a new species of toad. Somebody suggested he name the toad after himself, but he refused and it was named after a local indigenous tribe.



Dr. Dave has been bitten by many weird and wonderful animals over the years. He once got rattle snake venom in a screwdriver scratch on his hand while in America. This made him very sick and his arm become red and swollen. He has also contracted rabies after being bitten by a vampire bat in Mexico.



If for some reason Dr. Dave could no longer work as a biologist, he would become a carpenter or cabinet maker. In his spare time he makes his own furniture and renovates his 140 year old house. This work helps him to think about any problems he has during his research.
