Relationship with the environment

Dorothy Ambrose moved to her beautiful house in River Street in 1949 and named it 'Toad Hall'. She got the idea and the inspiration from the book *The Wind in the Willows,* by Kenneth Graham.



History of the Murray

In the 1970's the Murray's high flood level affected River Street, until the creation of Dartmouth Dam in 1979. The Murray Darling Basin Authority is in control of water release which affects the Murray River.

Inspiration

Dorothy Ambrose was inspired to work with the environment to give back what had been taken away.

One of her many experiences was protesting against a group of people wanting to grow tobacco at Morris Park.



Environmental opportunities

There are many opportunities in the local area and Dorothy Ambrose became involved in the Landcare group and environmental workshops. She has shared her environmental voice with lots of children and adults' all around the area.



Community award

In 2011 Dorothy won the Murray Catchment Management Authorities Millewa inspiration Award along with environmental enthusiasts, Marion Skehan, Faye Brookes and Anne Kingston. They planted trees on the sewerage pond where the brolgas used to nest.
