The Catchment Champions books are part of the Enviro-Stories Education Program.



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
Luke's family and childhood

Why Luke has chosen to work with fish


Luke has chosen to work with fish because he has always loved fishing. His favourite person to fish with is his dad. He went fishing a lot growing up when camping by the river.



Luke's current job



This means he helps save fish by protecting and improving their habitat, and working on breeding and stocking programs. He also checks fish for disease. Half his time is spent in the office in Albury the other half is spent in the Murray and Murrumbidgee waterways.

In Luke's role he also works with Landcare, farmers, Catchment Management Authorities, fishing clubs and groups, Greening Australia, local councils and other government departments.


The Billabong Creek

Landcare to help farmers put fences along the creek to keep stock out. He monitors threatened fish species by catching, measuring and counting the fish. The Billabong




Creek needs more people who care as much as Luke.






Southern Pygmy Perch

Formerly found in the Murray, Murrumbidgee and Lachlan catchments, the southern pygmy perch, which Luke is studying, has now disappeared from most locations in NSW. It has only been recorded at a handful of sites in the last 25 years. In NSW, only three populations are currently known from near Holbrook Jingellic and Yass.




Other fish Luke has worked with

Luke has worked with lots of fish! Some of them include the Southern Pygmy Perch, Macquarie Perch, Flatheaded Galaxias, Olive Perchlet and the Trout Cod. These are all threatened species.



The best things and worst things about his job

Luke likes lots of things about his job. He likes saving and releasing the fish and seeing the rivers and creeks healthy. Luke likes being outdoors, helping endangered fish and seeing his favourite kind of fish. He doesn't like the fish population decreasing.
