The Catchment Champions books are part of the Enviro-Stories Education Program.




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
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For all of May Maree Ryan's life, Maree (as she prefers to be called) has been interested in the environment. Her environmental journey began by saving orphaned possums at the age of 15. Maree tells us about her family history, her working life and early childhood. She describes her interest and also her contributions to the sustainability of her local environments.



Maree's parents Jack and Gwen Smith lived in the area of Balliang East, Victoria, all their lives. Maree was born in Bacchus Marsh and grew up on the family farm at Parwan with her two sisters. She loved the outdoors and had a lot of pets to care for. She spent many hours riding horses around the farm and local district. Maree would take care of injured wildlife until they were well enough to go back to the bush. She had a collection of pets chooks, goats, cats, birds and a pet possum reared with an eye dropper.





One of Maree's favourite past times was paddling in the nearby creek. She also loved walking along the high creek banks exploring, looking for seeds to resow and replant. From an early age Maree was aware that the trees near her home were dying and she understood the need to replant to keep trees going for the future.




She attended the small rural school of Balliang East Primary, the same school as her mother, then Bacchus Marsh High School. Her favourite day at primary school was "Arbour Day" when trees were planted on the roadside verge. Many trees she planted on the family property when a teenager, are the only trees in the paddock still growing. Maree married Mark and eventually moved to Berrigan. At that time land was much cheaper than in the Western Districts and irrigation was also a bonus - as irrigation was an insurance against drought. They started their family in Berrigan and have five children, Sally, Rob, Amy, Jessica and Emily. They also have three grandchildren, Tully, Charlie and Ted.



Her working career was started at the State Bank Victoria at Bacchus Marsh. She also worked as a teachers' aide, rouseabout and in aged care.

Maree also worked at Murray Catchment Management Authority in Berrigan where she helped set up the seed bank program.





The Murray Catchment Management Authority Seed Bank has seeds collected from areas across the Murray catchment. It is important to plant seeds from your own indigenous area as these seeds have characteristics to help the plant grow for the conditions of that area. Maree is now a fulltime farmer.
