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If you visit Wirraminna you are likely to meet a passionate environmentalist, Stacee. Stacee Staunton-Latimer has been volunteering and working at Wirraminna for the past four years and loves teaching young people about the environment.

The Educator

Wirraminna is an Environmental Education Centre that is adjacent to the small rural school of Burrumbuttock. It is used as a learning centre about the environment for visiting schools. Stacee works both here and at the school. Her job at Burrumbuttock is Garden Specialist for the 'The Stephanie Alexander Garden Program'.

Stacee says with the help of Mr Owen Dunlop and by volunteering, "I just walked into the job".



Family

Stacee grew up with two sisters, Elizabeth and Emily and an older brother Cameron. Growing up, Stacee's house was always full of native animals because her mum was a member of WIRES. Stacee helped her mum look after possums, joeys, squirrel gliders, sugar glider, echidnas and cockatoos. Her house was a wildlife menagerie.

Stacee recalls, "Animals were coming out of my ears".



Education

Stacee attended Jindera Public School and then went on to Murray High School, followed by a gap year in America and Europe.

On return Stacee completed a
TAFE course in "Conservation and
Land Management". Stacee finished
this course in half the time and because she did so
well, it earned her the Betty Carrasco TAFE Award.

Later Stacee was to find that Betty Carrasco had been a volunteer at Wirraminna.

Further studies in Natural Area Restoration and Animal Studies lead her closer to her real passion, to pass on her knowledge.

Passing on the Passion

One day while at work, the Murray Catchment Management Authority called Mr Dunlop. He then came to Stacee and said "We have a job for you".

"Stacee, we would like you to be the Support Officer for the Creative Catchment Kids program".



She was very excited about this, because it meant she could work with kids and pass on her knowledge. Stacee organises the workshops, edits our books and liaises with publishers and the website designers for this program.



Projects

Stacee's other project is making DVD's with Dr Dave. She started by reading out a script while Dr Dave showed animals in their environment. Stacee's now costaring with Dr Dave and has completed several videos on her own.



Recently she came back from Bourke having made 10 videos on outback New South Wales. TAFE have also asked her to front DVD's on sustainability and promotion which will be used for businesses and schools.





Projects



She has worked with Moulamein Public School and put together a DVD on the Edward River and she also has one on the Water Cycle in the Murray Darling Basin. Our Stacee is a real movie star.



The Corroboree Frogs

Stacee has also been involved with a new display at Wirraminna that houses eight Southern Corroboree Frogs. As there is only around fifty left of these frogs in the wild, Stacee says that it is very important that Wirraminna can display them and educate people on how important endangered Australian species are. A part of Stacee's job was to go to Taronga Zoo and be trained in keeping them. Stacee now looks after them and takes tours so people can come and see these amazing creatures.





When asked about what Stacee's favourite project was, she said that the Creative Catchment Kids, gives her the opportunity to, as she put it, "Transfer her knowledge and plant a seed in children so, that they can be inspired and develop a passion for their own environment." She says this is the future and the only way to avoid frustration brought about by peoples ignorance about natural resource management issues.

Stacee is an inspirational young go getter who we enjoyed talking and working with on this project. She has encouraged us to further our own studies about the environment and if others wish to go into this field her advice would be go to university.
