
### David's Education

#### David's Hobbies



### Striving for Improvement

David is learning about soil because soil is a farmer's factory. He says you can 'run' the factory better if you understand it. He uses an electromagnetic device to identify light and heavy soils. David also has a couple of special tree-lined laneways to help him with his sheep; David uses these laneways to make it easier and less stressful for the sheep when shifting them.



#### Retirement

David does not have any plans to retire. He intends to eventually scale back on his sheep and do more cropping. He is going to scale back to mostly crops because sheep are far more labour intensive and crops are a little easier to manage.
