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There are many successful farmers in Uranquinty. One of these farmers is Bruce Harris, who was born in Wagga Wagga.

Bruce chose farming by following after his father who was also a farmer. He produces a variety of things on his farm such as cattle, sheep, barley, canola and wheat.



There have been lots of advances in technology since Bruce started farming including the introduction of the auto-steer. Now his machinery includes John Deere tractors, agro drills and sprayers.

There are other workers on Bruce's farm too. They are his two sons and two other workers.

Bruce loves being outdoors in the sun. He improves the environment by conserving soil and planting new trees.





Dale Lewington lives on a farm south of Uranquinty. He was born in Wagga and has grown up around Uranquinty on a farm. Dale is a fourth generation farmer. He produces various things like beef cattle, wheat, canola, barley, lupins, oats and hay. In the future, he wants to continue improving and refining his farming practises so that he can farm sustainably for many years to come.





He has made some improvements on his farm lately by planting trees for windbreaks and shade for the cattle he produces, as well as spreading lime to increase the pH of the soil. Things have changed since he started farming like introducing technology such as auto steer. Farm management has also changed as previously you had to plough the paddock a couple times before you could sow but now direct drilling means you can sow straight away.



Dale has a lot of machinery on his farm. He has tractors, a header, an airseeder, a boomspray, a baler, mowers, trucks and augers. He does have workers on his farm. He employs part time workers as well as seasonal workers for harvest.

His farm improves the soil with lime and direct drilling practises which keeps erosion down. He also spends time controlling weeds. Other improvements include planting more trees for birds and shade.

Dale likes farming because it means working for yourself. Farming involves lots of diversity with different jobs throughout the year. Also the constant decision making is challenging and enjoyable.







This is Pamela Bourne. She is a farmer just out of Uranquinty. Pam and Bob's farm is called 'Weemont'. Pam was born in a private hospital in Wagga Wagga. Pam comes from a long line of farmers in her family. Her family farm has not just influenced her, but also her two sisters and two brothers.



Pam and her husband, Bob, work hard every single day to produce oat crops, stock feed/hay, pasture, lucerne, clover, cattle and sheep. Bob and Pam Bourne are happy with the way things are going on their farm and they say they wouldn't change a thing.



Since Pam and Bob started farming a lot of things have changed, such as technology. Pam said that everything is computerised now and much easier to use and much easier to do farm jobs.

Pam and Bob Bourne have two casual workers on their farm. These workers help with general maintenance, farm work and shearing.



Recently on their farm, they built a new hay and machinery shed so that they can store the hay without getting any moisture in it and to stop the machinery from getting wet. Mrs Bourne uses all sorts of machinery on her farm, like the tractor and the spray unit. Pamela sometimes uses the cattle truck to transport cattle to and from town.





Pam and Bob love working on the farm because they love helping the environment. Pam said that their farm improves the environment by sowing the crops. Sowing stops the soil and the seeds from blowing away. The couple have also recently planted a great big line of plantation trees. Another reason why Pam and Bob love farming, is because they love working with and helping the animals on their farm, 'Weemont'.
