

Local Land Heroes is part of Enviro-Stories, a PeeKdesigns education program.













Our Albury 'Local Land Heroes' are the Sekhon family (Amritpal, Paramjeet, Ravnit and Jagjeet) and their produce store "Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Market" in Lavington. This store sells delicious fresh fruit and vegetables to people all over the border. The Sekhon family makes sure they have the best quality fruit and veggies on their shelves every day!



Ravnit's family is from India. They moved to Albury,
Australia because they wanted to live a better life. Her
dad, mother and brother moved to Australia first, leaving
Ravnit with her mum's friend. They liked Australia so
much that they invited Ravnit to come to Australia too.
The Sekhons chose Albury because of its friendly people
and safe environment.

Ravnit's parents wanted to open a fruit and vegetable store and be active members of the local business community. The Sekhons are all vegetarians. In the Sekhon family there is Param (mum), Amritpal (dad), Ravnit (herself) and Jagjeet (brother). The Sekhons enjoy running their store because it allows them to meet lots of people.



You will find the Sekhon's "Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Market" at 317 Urana Road, Lavington.

When customers come into the store, they select the fruit or vegetables they wish to purchase. Most of the produce selected is weighed and the customers are charged according to the weight of the produce. Ravnit often helps in the store. Ravnit's family pride themselves on the quality of the fruit and vegetables they sell fresh every day.






The Sekhon family gets produce from Melbourne. Mr. Sekhon goes there every Wednesday morning. Mr. Sekhon buys produce from Melbourne Markets. But it is not just fruits and vegetables that Mr. Sekhon purchases. The Sekhon family sells a large variety of other items like herbs, Indian food, hot and cold chips and even household items like toilet paper.





Mr. Sekhon then transports the goods back to Albury on a large truck that can hold twelve pallets upwards; two pallets wide and eight pallets long. The Sekhons own the truck which saves them the hassle of hiring one. The fruit and vegetables are stored in a cool room because they need to stay fresh. The other goods are put directly into the store.



Fruit Salad Recipe

Recommended fruit

Watermelon, Rock melon, Grapes, Pineapple, Strawberries, Bananas, Apple, Orange and a dollop of yoghurt for extra flavour.

Method

Cut fruit up into small bite-sized pieces and put them into a bowl or dish. Serve with a little bit of yoghurt. Eat fresh. Yum!

All of these ingredients can be found at the Sekhon's "Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Market".





Some of the items sold in Ravnit's family store are fruits like apples, pears, oranges, bananas, rock melon, watermelon, pineapples and vegetables like carrots, potatoes, onions, snow peas and corn. They sell ice-cream, hot and cold chips and grocery items like toilet paper, sauces, rice, pasta, flour, biscuits, lollies, herbs (mint, basil, coriander), soft drinks and dried fruits.



Experts say that we should have five servings of fruit and vegetables every day. At the "Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Market", you will find super fresh produce that is 'Yummy for your Tummy'! The sweet smell of fresh radishes and raspberries fills the air when you enter their market. Ravnit and her family definitely know how to please fruit and veggie lovers with their delicious fresh produce.

Ravnit's family members all have very important jobs to do. Everyone in the family helps out in lots of different ways. They all enjoy greeting and serving their customers.
