- Establishing stronger partnerships with NRM, Landcare, school communities, educators and regional groups to allow for future collaboration and information transfer to occur more effectively, and
- Promoting and implementing best practice management into key areas and helping to address key pest animal issues impacting on biodiversity and agricultural production.

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
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

One spring day, young Rosie Rabbit peeped outside feeling hungry. She knew she would have to leave the safety of her warren in search of food.






She hopped along in the sunshine towards the yellow canola paddock. On the way, Rosie visited her cousin Bob's warren. She found him deep inside.

Did you know?



Did you know?

Rabbits are a feral animal that have caused many problems throughout Australia for both agriculture and our native environment. They compete with native and domestic animals for food; cause loss of plant biodiversity and reduce crops; spread invasive weeds and build warrens causing soil erosion.




They turned and fled from the angry ram.

"OMG! IT IS A BIG RED FOX!" screamed Rosie.

Did you know?

Some of the ways we try to control and eradicate rabbits include: shooting, trapping, ferreting, poisoning and fumigation of warrens, destruction of warrens using heavy machinery, removal of habitat including timber and woody weeds like blackberries and introduction of viruses like myxomatosis and calicivirus.




There he was, a big red fox standing, staring at them. The two rabbits stood, frozen stiff.
