
The Yabby family who couldn't find a home

The Yabby family who couldn't find a home

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
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This is a story about Lou and Lucy's search for a new home.

One day Lou and his family decided to leave their home because it was no longer a nice place to live. It was not clean anymore and this was affecting their health.






We *can't* live here because there are no native trees on the banks. We need native trees because they drop leaves and branches all year round. They also keep the banks together and provide shade and shelter.

We *can't* live here because there are no bins and people have thrown rubbish in the river. Those messy humans should really learn to take their rubbish home.




We *can't* live here because there is oil in the water from boats. If boats are not being looked after properly then they can leak fuel into the water.



We *can't* live here because the farmers have not put fences near the river and the cows are pooping in the water.

Finally our yabby family arrived at the Gippsland Lakes in the Tambo River, near Swan Reach. They had a good look around and liked what they saw.

They decided...we *can* live here because there are lots of native trees on the riverbanks. The trees provide shelter, help to stop erosion and keep the river clean.



We *can* live here because there is no sewage in the water. The people of Swan Reach must take good care of their properties making sure nothing is leaking into the river.



We *can* live here because there are lots of logs in the water. Logs are great because fish, yabbies and other creatures use them to lay their eggs on and to hide in and under. Submerged logs provide valuable shelter in the rivers and lakes.



We *can* live here because there is lots of seagrass growing in the shallow, warm water. Seagrass is very important habitat for the creatures who live in the lakes.



We *can* live here because the farmer put fences around the banks of the river. This means there is no mud or cow poop in the water.



We *can* live here because someone has cleaned up all the old fishing lines and tackle. Fishing lines and tackle pose a threat to the animals who live in and around the water.



People love living in Swan Reach. They can go fishing, boating, motorbike riding, bird watching, swimming, camping, kayaking and bushwalking.



Because they love the area, the people take better care of the rivers and lakes. This keeps the water healthy for all of the native animals that rely on it.
