
Local Land Heroes - Securing Our Region

In 2015, students involved in the Creative Catchment Kids program researched and wrote stories about their 'Local Land Heroes' who are involved in pest management in the Murray and Murrumbidgee regions. These heroes are local individuals, couples, a business or industries that have made a difference in their local community by contributing to the management of pest animals and plants. The program was generously funded by Murray Local Land Services and Riverina Local Land Services.

Local Land Heroes is part of Enviro-Stories, a PeeKdesigns education program.




There are about 100 declared noxious weeds in NSW.

Some of the worst ones are Patterson's Curse (above right), Bathurst Burr, Hore Hound, Devil's Claw, Prickly Pear (right), Thorne Apple (above left) and Boxthorn.




Animals are greatly affected by weeds. Boxthorn (above) prevents animals from getting to water and Devil's Claw (below left) gets caught in sheep's wool and eyes.

Sometimes Daryll can help smaller animals out of situations like this but bigger animals are harder to handle. Tiger Pear (below right) is a particularly nasty weed because of the sharp, pointed barbs








Weeds destroy natural habitats such as forests and grasslands. They invade crops and reduce yields. Weeds choke natural systems like rivers, forests and fields. Weeds cost Australian farmers \$1.5 billion a year in weed control and a further \$2.5 billion is lost each year in agricultural production.


Daryll Morris and his staff have many different solutions to get rid of the wild weeds in the Berrigan Shire. He uses lots of different types of chemicals and burns off the weeds with fire. Daryll also uses mechanical removal which means that he uses big machines to dig them up.



Another way Daryll fights the problem is through the Weed Warrior Program. It is a program that started up in 2002.

Daryll and his team of nine workers hope to solve the problem of weeds by creating interest, and generating knowledge, of the local weed issues. It links school students with community groups, farmers and workers to plan, implement and evaluate a weed biological







Weeds rate as one of the most serious threats to primary production and the environment in Australia. Education and awareness is critical. The Weed Warrior Program is educating children about how weeds affect the environment and how to stop them. It gets the students involved with biological control where you use natural enemies of the weeds to exterminate them.



The Weed Warrior Program highlights that weeds are everyone's problem and provides opportunities for the community of NSW to become part of the solution. Early detection of weeds is the best way to limit their spread and impact.

The Weed Warrior Program also aims for people to develop a commitment to and responsibility for the control of noxious weeds in their area.





Weedy Facts

- Boxthorn was introduced as a garden or hedge plant in the mid 1800s.
- Boxthorn is most commonly found on neglected land in arid and temperate Australia.
- Devil's Claw is native to South Africa and still is used in folk remedies today.
- Patterson's Curse is considered a weed because it reduces pasture productivity and is toxic to livestock.
