
The hunters eventually captured Penny's parents and took them away. Penny was stranded on the farm in the paddocks.

All of a sudden she saw her mum and dad. Penny felt better and looked out the window to try to figure out how to escape.




Penny and her family thought that if they did try and escape, the farmer would catch them again.


The farmer then put a Judas collar around Penny's neck. She did not like it one bit.
