



Chuditch the native cat was irritated. Someone had been hunting the native animals and he was sure he knew who the culprits were. Chuditch called in all the bush animals.




"I am angry!" said Chuditch.

"I agree," said Koolbalong the frog. "One almost caught and ate me. I am now scared for my life"




Djili Djit the fish sobbed, "A feral cat ate all my baby fingerlings."






Yonga Kangaroo said to Noorn the snake, "Feral cats cover a huge territory and eat too much food."






Noorn spat angrily, "It's all mans fault. He cuddles them as pets!"





"Cats also have too many kittens. They can have eighteen babies a year," Noorn continued.







"Stop dumping kittens in the bush. And look after your pets so they don't run away."
