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Scratch! Scratch! Scratch!

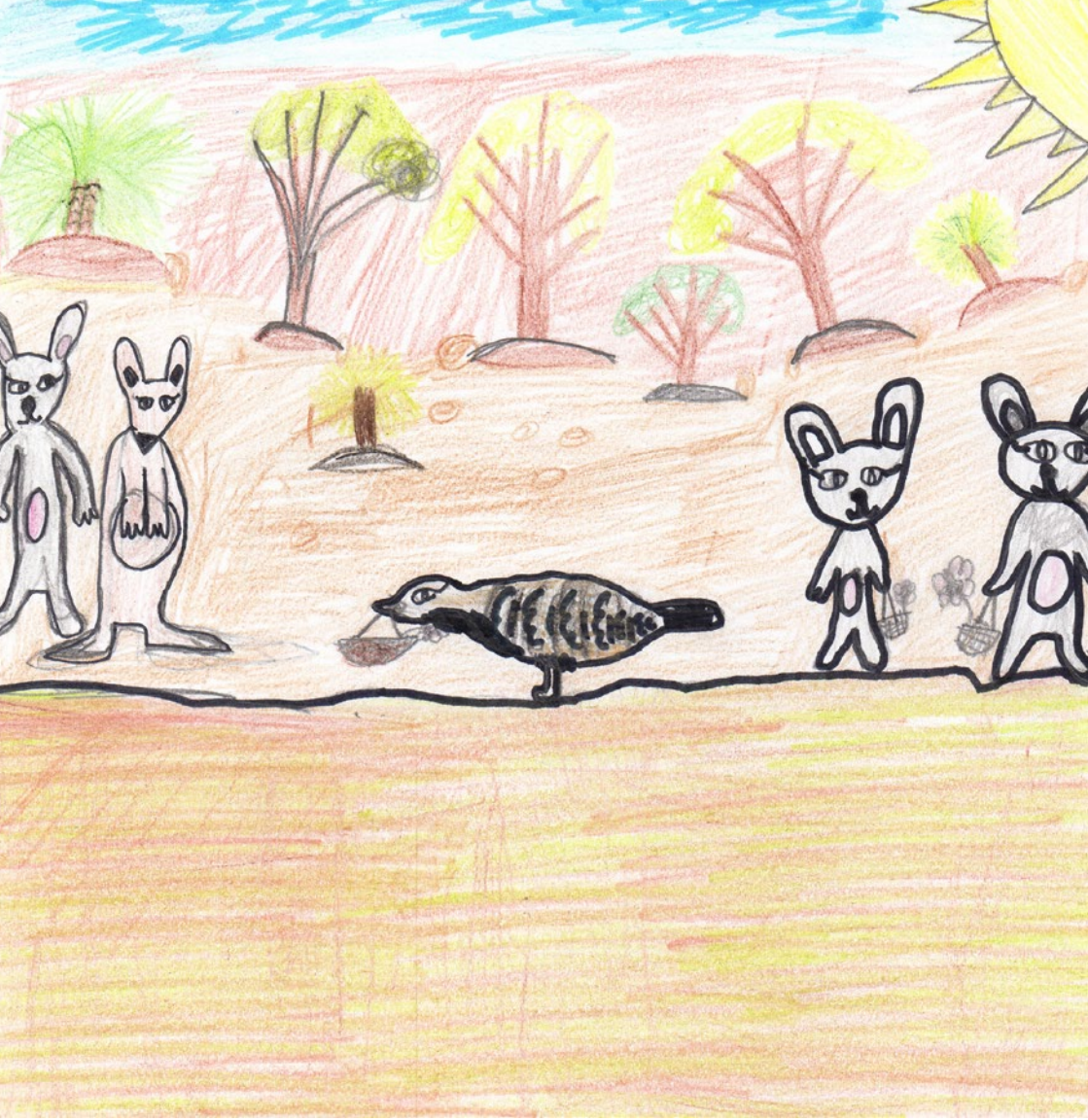
Maley the malleefowl kicked and scraped, preparing to lay her eggs in her enormous mound. She laid them and then covered them over so they would keep warm...
