

Once there were two ducks called Henry and Ary. They lived in the reeds along the Narrabri Creek.


Henry and Ary were very excited. Ary had laid an egg and they were waiting for their new duckling to hatch.





Ary knew that her egg would be hatching soon and that if the drought didn't break they would have to find a new place to live. They needed somewhere they could find clean water, food and good shelter.




Henry had an idea. He thought that the best way to find a new home was to see where other animals were happy living. He flew to the Pilliga to find their friends and to check out their homes.






Karen lived up a tree, slept all day and was awake all night. She ate *Eucalyptus* leaves and worst of all, there wasn't much water anywhere.

Not a great life for ducks!




On went the search for a new home as Henry flew to visit Owen the owl.


