







This little family lived on a beautiful cotton farm.

One disastrous, winter day Edwina's grandparents were trying to warm up in the sun when a huge tractor suddenly passed by and her grandparents were squashed.





Tractors are an earthworms biggest enemy. Their huge tread pattern compacts the soil. The soil becomes hard and compacted and earthworms cannot survive.


Another enemy of the earthworm is the rotary hoe. It digs up the soil churning it around to loosen the hard clumps. Subsequently, destroying the home of earthworms.





Elliza, Elliot and Edwina had no choice but to move away from the cotton farm.


