

This project is supported by Wheatbelt NRM through funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program.









Nalia and Nutty told the other four numbats in their family.

Mum and Dad said, "Those humans are farmers. They chop down the trees to make paddocks for crops and livestock."






The trio finally escaped the terrible predator.

Bailey, Mitchy and Nutty kept going until Mitchy said, "Hey! I remember flying over a reserve where native animals are protected."


"Great," replied the others, "we'll all head there."


