

Peony, the African Pygmy Hedgehog






So, the two Brown Marmorated Stink Bugs scuttled around and soon found a backyard orchard. They climbed into a peach tree and began sucking the sweet juices.







"This is a great place to start a family!" exclaimed Bianca.




Two kangaroos, Chip and Chase were getting concerned. Some of their bush friends has disappeared and had never returned.
