After a few days of showers, the cattle feed and crops started to sprout again. Things were looking up after the long drought.




After weeks of rain the water was beginning to cause another problem. It started to rise up, drowning the crops and killing the grass.

They heard the thunder roar and saw lightning strikes hit the ground around the farm. Lily noticed all the roads filling up as the water poured across the land.








