



Samantha and Levi have been best friends for years and love nothing more than getting outside and going on huge hikes.


They also love finding and identifying new plants as they walk through the bush.

As they continued on their walk, Samantha thought she spied an interesting looking shrub in the distance. Was it the Matchstick Banksia they were looking for?


They planned to check it out, but became distracted by a beautiful purple and white plant they stopped to admire.





The farmer came right up to the edge of the paddock and then started to lower his blade. He was going to clear the bushland where they found the Matchstick Banksia.

The farmer stopped. Samantha and Levi asked the farmer what he was doing? The farmer said that he was clearing the bush paddock to expand his crop.


The kids told him that they had found a Matchstick Banksia there, which is an endangered species. They asked him if he would mind waiting until tomorrow before clearing the area.







He explained that he had decided to protect the bush area where it was growing.




He thanked them for caring so much about the Aussie Bush and told them he was so impressed that he was going to help raise awareness about how special they are.
