


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
The wind was blowing through the wattle and blue gum trees where Samantha the snake lived.





It was known that turtles could be found at Canoe Point. They lay eggs in the sand and swim in the water. Yet Samantha did not know where Canoe Point was.






Samantha was so excited to see the turtles and the turtle eggs, she set off early morning for her big adventure.




Samantha travelled all day and night through the bush hoping to find the turtles. During her journey, she stumbled across a cockatoo and a kookaburra.
